

Current Situation and Future Direction of Medical and Health Management System for the Workers at Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Station

1 . Evaluation of Current Situation

Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Station

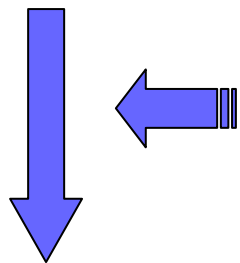
- On August, 2011, there were 13 (thirteen) patients at the Emergency Care Room, Unit 5/6 Service Building (hereafter "Unit 5/6 Emergency Care Room").
- Emergency medical doctors have been assigned to the Unit 5/6 Emergency Care Room where they handle first-aid treatment for heat disorders and external injuries, etc.

J Village

- Due to an intensified focus in conducting routine medical care, the number of patients has been increasing.
(Number of patients on August, 2011: 8 workers/day)

2 . Change of Situation and Future Tasks

- (1) Further health management is necessary due to the prolongation of site work.
Especially, countermeasures against influenza during the winter season is important.
- (2) Number of workers whose effective dose exceeds 100 mSv has been increasing, as the evaluation of exposure dose progresses.
The number of workers undergoing occasional health checks are increasing.
- (3) The move into Shin Hirono company residence (1,600 rooms) was started on July, 2011.
The enhancement of medical services at J Village is necessary.



3 . Future Direction

Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Station

- While we had planned to close down the Unit 5/6 Emergency Care Room by the end of September 2011, we decided to keep it open and will continue to assign emergency medical doctors during and after October of this year.
- We have decided to conduct first-aid treatment at Fukushima Daiichi. We will continue with emergency medical treatment for heat disorders, external injuries, etc. and judge whether or not patients need to be transferred to medical institutions.

J Village

- Doctors belonging to the University of Occupational and Environmental Health or Labors' Hospital are assigned to enhance worker health management. (preventive inoculation against influenza, etc.)
- Occasional health checks and general practices will be continued.
